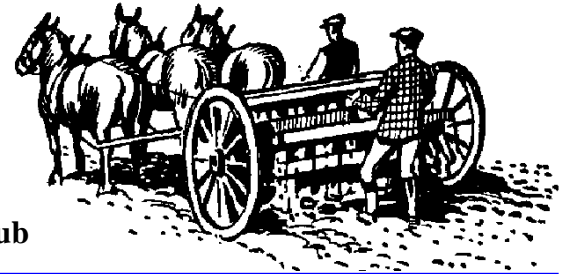

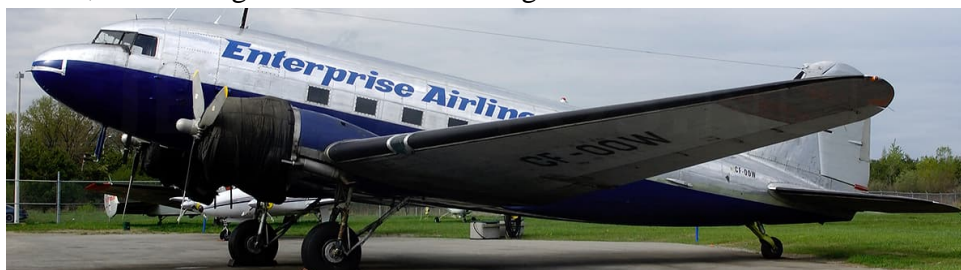
Most of the group took this opportunity to pay for their membership. Look at the photo of our oldest member Gord Wilson and our new and youngest members.

2025 HAHC Machinery Show:

As you all know by now, the Hope Agricultural Club Directors made the difficult decision to cancel the Annual Outdoor Antique Machinery Show after a run of 31 years. Also, the Antique Classic Snowmobile Association of Canada Show is cancelled after 6 years.

There were two main reasons given for the HAHC show coming to an end:

1. Over the past 5 years the number of pieces of equipment being displayed has significantly declined from 150 to 80. Our aging members are no longer able to transport their antiques pieces let alone transverse the fields to enjoy the activities.

2. The age of the organizers, 70 - 80+ years, find it very physically demanding. This, along with the lack of volunteers to ensure the show functions as it should, has led the Board of Directors to make this very difficult decision. This was not an easy decision, but the time has come.

The Club will continue to host Open Houses and the Annual Fund Raiser Buffet Dinners at the Centre in Canton this year and into the future. Also, we are looking at options for new and exciting activities we can host at the Centre.

The HAHC Directors would like to thank all our members, sponsors, families, and friends for their support over the past 31 years. We look forward to seeing you all at the AMC in the future, beginning with the Open House and Buffet Dinner June 7 - 8th.

Orono Fall Fair:

Our presence at the Orono Fall Fair on September 4th to 7th was another highlight of the season. The club's booth was located in the vintage tractor area, surrounded by over 100 restored tractors. Sales of our tractor raffle draw tickets went very well, bringing in over \$1000 across the weekend! Visitors enjoyed sharing stories about farm equipment, old and new, in the great weather. Special thanks to Bob Barrie, Terry Essery, Jack Malfait, Ivan Elford and daughter Wendy Elford, and Earl Ashby for transporting equipment and representing the club with such enthusiasm.



Port Hope Fall Fair:

At this year's fair, held September 11th to 14th, members presented an educational display to more than 200 local school children, focused on the importance of tree planting and environmental stewardship. Using a forester planter pulled by a John Deere, the team demonstrated how tree planting has evolved from shovel work to mechanized planting. Students also learned that the Eastern White Pine is Ontario's official tree, while the Maple is Canada's! With no show this year it was decided to make the September Open House a two-day event, and it was held on September 20th and 21st. It was well advertised and well attended. 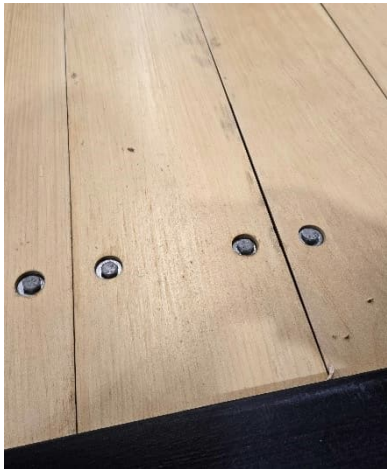


2025 Donations, Acquisitions and Restorations:

One way that the club grows is through the donations received and various acquisitions by the club's directors or through members. Not all of these are items to display as part of the collection as items are often needed to store, display or transport various equipment. Here are some highlights from the past year.

Maple Leaf Truck:

Many of you will know about the club's 1929 Maple Leaf truck that is an ongoing restoration. Well, thanks to our own Greg St. Amand, the truck sports new deck boards and side rails. Greg spent many hours in his shop manufacturing the boards, rails, and staining them to perfection. Great job Greg!



Shiny Chrome:

Meanwhile, Ivan Elford has been busy working away on anything chrome and making it sparkle. If you want to learn how to polish and shine anything, talk to Ivan – he has the products and skills to bring old metals back to life. Do not worry, everything Ivan cleans for the truck is boxed away and kept away from the floor action.

New Additions to the HAHC Collection:

We've recently received several generous donations of equipment to the club, including:

- An **antique icebox**. These were packed with insulation, such as straw, sawdust, cork, or seaweed. A large block of ice, typically lasting 5 to 7 days, was placed in a compartment in the top of the icebox. As the ice slowly melted, cool air circulated down to the shelves below, to keep produce and dairy cool.





•**Cigar and tobacco plug cutter.** This would be used to cut cigars and chewing tobacco to length for sale. Tobacco production was a major industry in the Durham/Northumberland areas for decades before its decline in the 1980s.



•An I.H.C. Farmall Model A tractor



•**Horse-drawn plow** donated by the Dickinson family. New member Ken Towles added a fresh coat of paint to the plow, making it ready for display.

•An antique wooden washing machine with a copper tub, accompanied by this story from its donor, Judy Bacon:

“This machine was gifted to my dad, Al Coker, about 60-65 years ago. He ran ‘Coker’s Fix-It Shop’ on Marsh Street in Port Hope, with the motto ‘We can fix anything – but a broken heart.’”

As a kid, I remember it in his workshop, and after he passed in 1979, I became the keeper of this treasure. My Dad would be so pleased to know that his treasure will now be cared for by the kind folks at the Hope Agricultural Heritage Club.”



Milk Bottling Machine

A couple of years ago, we received a milk bottling machine and capper. This wonderful machine is to the left of the door in our new building. Great! Everyone heads right because that's where the big stuff is, Ha Ha. But really, this is an amazing machine. Along with it came this story, which I never had time to put into a letter to send to you. But today's the day you get a bit of history from our milk industry.

Farny and the Bottle Capper

Recently, our NVDHS Member Farncomb "Farny" LeGresley was cleaning out one of his large sheds on his property on Metcalf Street and George Manners in Bond Head. He had an old Milwaukee Milk Bottle Filler and Capper from his family's "Newcastle Dairy" business many years ago.

Farny advised that when he was about 10 years old, he would use this machine to fill (with fresh milk) and then cap the milk bottles at the dairy. He said that he would probably do about 300 bottles in a day and it was tiring work for a young fellow.

He wondered if NVDHS would be interested in having the item so gave me a call. I went down with my friend, Greg St. Amand and we decided that it was a large, heavy item and not suited for display at our Historical Room in Newcastle. Greg and I are also both members of the Hope Agricultural Heritage Club, and after checking with Earl, it turns out they do not have one of those at their Museum. They were glad to receive it and also indicated that if NVDHS ever wants it for a display, they would be pleased to loan it to us at any time.

In 1928 they and a few other associated and affiliated companies merged to create the Cherry-Burrell Corporation. At the onset of World War II, four out of every five milk bottles in the country were filled by Cherry-Burrell equipment. After the war, the company expanded its dairy product line to include homogenizers, freezers, and other equipment, along with its filler machines. Since then, Cherry-Burrell equipment has been placed in factories in more than 70 countries.

This Antique Milk Bottle Filler & Capper was made by the Cherry Burrell Dairy Corporation, who actually patented the first centrifugal cream separator in the United States in 1881. The machine was used to bottle and cap quart and pint bottles of milk and milk products, with the capping mechanism using the last patent date of November 30, 1920, and the filler using the last patent date of June 11, 1929. This appears to be a smaller Model "BB" machine serial number "5938". This particular unit would only fill and cap 2 bottles at a time. The larger units could fill up to 30 bottles a minute. I am sure Farny would have preferred the larger model.

So, the next time you are at the AMC, look for this.



No Big Projects This Summer:

It was too hot—but behind-the-scenes work has been going on. Ivan has led a charge to clean up the view from the road: trees trimmed, the sign painted, and other things to try and make the Antique Machinery Centre look more professional. Inside, there are lots of changes to the building and cleanup. Bare was busy wrangling the guys to help put in permanent wiring to all our buildings. This is a major undertaking as the

cables had to be buried and boxes for plugs added. Our hope was that at the open house we will not have any extension cords running to the buildings. Just a small thing as most people won't see it, but a big thing as it makes our area so much safer.

A big thank you to Steve and his backhoe, Art for his electrical skills, and everyone who pitched in with shovels, flashlights, good humour, and the effort in making this happen.

On-going work includes planning the installation of new eavestroughs next year and continued sorting and cataloguing of supplies, tools and equipment.

One of the true joys of this club is watching a piece of history come back to life. This November, I wanted to highlight the transformation of an **unstyled John Deere AR** donated by the Don Miedema family.

BEFORE:

Pictured here is the tractor as it arrived - weathered paint, years of honest wear, and all the hallmarks of a machine that had lived a full working life! The signature John Deere green was faded, the metal showed a little age, but it was clear this tractor had been earning its keep long before it rolled into the AMC.

AFTER:

And here it is now, fully restored! From the fresh coat of classic John Deere green and yellow to the detailed finishing touches across the engine and frame, club members have brought this tractor back to showpiece condition. It now stands as a proud example of the preservation work done by HAH Club members and a testament to their skill, dedication, and teamwork. Well done to everyone involved!
